Probasco is also the author of *Highway 12*, about scenic State Route 12, Utah's only All-American Road.

Award-winning author, **Steven J. Clark**, began his career with a short story published in his junior high school annual, The Panther, when he was in seventh grade. Clark later went on to a thirty year plus career in marketing and sales. He is the former editor and publisher of a national trade journal, Manufactured Housing News. Jason Friedman received his PhD in history from Michigan State University in 2009 and works currently as a history and political science instructor at Wasatch Academy. A modern American historian; Friedman's primary research focuses on the cultural issues surrounding the American presidency and the balance of power during the 1970s. Friedman has expanded his historical research interests to include the institutional history of Wasatch Academy and the school's founder, Duncan McMillan.

Jack C. Billings is a third generation descendant of immigrant Mormon converts. Although not a member of his ancestor' church, he remains close to his roots residing still at the Bountiful, Utah house he was brought to as a baby. While interested in writing in high school in Boise, Idaho and also in college at the University of Utah, he is a late arrival with this as a first piece of writing outside the occasional op-ed newspaper submissions.

**Ed Meyer** was the original director of the Utah Heritage Highway 89 Alliance, later to become the National Mormon Pioneer Heritage Area. For three decades, he directed Utah's rural development programs as an appointee of five Utah governors. He served on the City Council in Kanab, Utah, as well as the community's heritage and arts councils. Meyer is currently a board member of Zane Grey's West Society.
